God didn't stop, and neither did we! Inevitably, every conversation whether it is with someone you know or a complete stranger, the conversation is about the coronavirus pandemic and the impact of it on all our lives. Often people, (from outside the parish) say to me "When were you able to start having services again?" and I tell them that we never stopped! They didn't happen in the usual way but we have had a service every Sunday in our group of parishes, from the initial short services recorded on my phone, thanks to Mike Lee, to the live-stream services, thanks to the webcam

and Graham Hayes. Whilst many things could not go ahead, and many things disappeared from our lives, worship and prayer has continued, and church (as in the community) and God did not disappear. The online services, online Midweek Prayer and Chat on a Wednesday morning and our Midweek Musical Treats were the online ways of trying to keep connecting with people and to keep worshipping. Thank you to Mike Lee, Graham Hayes, Mike Hayes, Charles Pearson and Alan Rowden who helped to make those happen.

With the easing of restrictions over the past few weeks, activities in our parish halls have begun to resume, and elsewhere in this newsletter, there is information about those things. The government's roadmap envisages a final lifting of restrictions on 22nd October 2021 including that of social distancing which will make a significant difference to the capacity of our churches but especially to St Thomas' Church which has been operating with 12 pods plus a churchwarden's pod for the past 18 months whenever we have been allowed to have in-person worship. However, given the recent numbers of COVID-19 cases and hospitalisations, there is a possibility that the final part of the roadmap may be delayed. We await further information.

Sunday Clubs: Given the current numbers and the fact that children are in pods within their school classes, we are not going to re-open the Sunday Clubs just yet. We feel that it would be safer to wait until after the schools have reopened after Christmas and to then consider re-opening our Sunday Clubs in both churches.

Remembering: Last year, All Saints' Day was on a Sunday and we said that if anyone would like someone who had died, to be remembered at that service to let us know and that we would light a tea-light candle for them. Such was the response that we had to do it on the third Sunday of November as well. We will be doing it again this year. If you would like someone remembered, please send me a note, a text or an email.

Sausage Service WITH Sausages and Wedges! During the pandemic, we have had online 'Sausageless Services'!!! Not the same thing at all! Subject to government restrictions, from Sunday 14th November 2021, we will be back having in-person Sausage Services on the second Sunday of the month at 18.30 hours in St Philip and St James' Church, followed by sausages and potato wedges.

Select Vestries: Thank you to the members of the select vestries who have kept looking after the fabric, furnishings and finance of our parishes in difficult circumstances-we are zoomed out from online vestry meetings!

On 29<sup>th</sup> June 1821, the deeds, constituting the new Parish of Booterstown out of Donnybrook Parish were registered. Over the last five years, we had given much thought to how we would celebrate this, the first of a number of significant anniversaries in the life of our grouped parishes, over the next few years, but COVID-19 put paid to those plans. With the return to in-church worship it May, we were able to mark the 200th anniversary of the foundation of Booterstown Parish in a low-key way on Sunday 27th June 2021, at the united service in St Philip and St James' Church, and we had refreshments outside afterwards. Thank you to those who decorated the church so beautifully and who provided the refreshments and put up

Stephen Forde in 1995, and in 2026, we will be celebrating the 200th anniversary of the foundation of Booterstown National School, so we are going to

# **ADULT CONFIRMATION**

Confirmation For the past few years, we have had a number of adults being confirmed or whom have re-affirmed their Confirmation promises. Some had opted out of confirmation at the time when they might have been expected to be confirmed and when their friends were being confirmed; some just never got around to it. Those who re-affirmed their confirmation vows had been confirmed previously in another Christian denomination but had now become part of the Church of Ireland, and felt that this was something that they wanted to do.

The preparation for this is done separately to the preparation for the teenage candidates. Already, there have been some enquiries from adults about the possibility of being confirmed. A lot of what is on page 5 applies here too! This is your chance to explore, to ask all those questions you have wanted to ask, and to see if confirmation (or re-affirmation) at this time is right for you. Please contact the Rector if you are thinking about this.



# CONFIRMATION

*Confirmation* Confirmations in our Rural Deanery (a group of five parochial units) are held in the Spring (usually February). We have yet to receive the dates and venues from the Archbishop's Office, but I very much hope that we will be hosting a confirmation service.

There will be a meeting for all those enquiring about confirmation (and their parents) on Wednesday 20<sup>th</sup> October 2021 in St Philip and St James' Church at 8pm.

As always, I ask those who are considering Confirmation (and their parents) to think carefully about it. I take Confirmation and the preparation for Confirmation seriously, and I think it is important that we as family members, and as a parish, encourage those who wish to be confirmed, to do so with integrity.

If you are considering Confirmation, please think about the following:

1. The decision to be confirmed must be your own choice. It is not a decision for your parents, grandparents, friends, etc. to make. It is you who will be standing up in church declaring your belief in God, and affirming your faith in Jesus Christ. It is important that you feel that you can answer these and the other questions honestly. Confirmation is not the end of the journey; it is a stage on the journey of faith where you feel that you are ready to take on the promises that were made for you at baptism and take responsibility for your faith development and nurture.

It is you who will be answering the following questions:

Are you ready with your own mouth and from your own heart to affirm your faith in Jesus Christ?

Do you believe and accept the Christian faith into which you are baptized?

Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of the bread, and in the prayers?

Will you persevere in resisting evil, and whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord?

#### Will you proclaim by word and example the good news of God in Christ? Will you seek and serve Christ in all people, loving your neighbour as yourself?

2. There is no **right age** for confirmation, but I do feel that candidates should be **at least** in 1<sup>st</sup> Year in secondary school. Please do not feel that you should be getting confirmed because you are a certain age, or even in a particular class in school. There can be a feeling that one gets confirmed in 2<sup>nd</sup> Year or 4<sup>th</sup> Year or whatever. This is a pity, because each individual matures and grows in their faith in their own way and their own time. Therefore, some feel ready to be confirmed at an earlier age than others, or at a later age than others; I have prepared people from the age of 13 years to 61 years for Confirmation. I have found that the older candidate, or the candidate who makes the decision themselves to be confirmed, is more aware they are of what is involved, and what they are promising and committing to at Confirmation.

3. Candidates sometimes feel that because they have started going to Confirmation classes, they cannot 'back out' of being confirmed even if they feel that they are not ready for it. Please do not feel that this is the case. I have had candidates who have postponed being confirmed because they felt that they were not ready to take on the commitment, and I admire the care and honesty with which they have approached Confirmation.

Confirmation is an exciting time for those considering it, and for a parish or group of parishes. We, as a group of parishes, will support those preparing for Confirmation by our prayers and our encouragement.

We could not possible spend seven hours a day—which is the length of a day at a physical General Synod—on Zoom, hence we had two-hour sessions each day, on the morning and evening of Thursday 30th September 2021, on the afternoon and evening of Friday 1st October 2021 and a final two-hour session on the morning of Saturday 2nd October 2021.

There was a pre-recorded Opening Service of the General Synod which is still available for everyone to view and worship with, on the Church of Ireland and the General Synod websites..

hygiene products, toothbrushes, toothpaste, hoodies, etc.

*The Capuchin Day Centre* provides 700-800 hot meals everyday. Due to COVID-19, these are now provided as takeaways and the service users are able to go into St Mary of the Angels' Church on Church Street and eat their meals there. Baby supplies are available on Mondays from the Centre and over 1,500 grocery parcels are given out every Wednesday at the Day Centre.

# THE ALICE LEAHY TRUST

TRUST, now known as THE ALICE LEAHY TRUST continues to do extraordinary work in difficult circumstances.

In our two parishes, we have an ongoing working relationship with **THE ALICE LEAHY TRUST. TRUST** was founded in 1975 as a private charitable trust (Charity No. CHY7014), and since then has been working with people who are homeless in Dublin. It is a non-political, non-denominational voluntary body which provides medical and related services for people who are homeless, operating out of a premises provided at a nominal rent by the Iveagh Trust. Up to 50 men (mostly men) and women call each morning, the majority of whom are sleeping out (aged 18 to 85 years).

TRUST is urgently in need the following items:

#### MEN'S CLOTHING ....

Hoodies; jeans; track-suit bottoms; jumpers; water-proof jackets; long-johns (underwear—must be new); strong, sturdy shoes (preferably runners)

#### THEY ALSO NEED ....

pot noodles (preferably chicken); pot curries (preferably chicken); cup-a-soups; mini-bars (chocolate, etc.); toiletries (shampoo, shower gel, toothpaste, toothbrushes, female hygiene products)

The items can be left at the back of either of the churches and they will then be taken into THE ALICE LEAHY TRUST.

Parishioners have been very generous over the years to TRUST (and its successor, **THE ALICE LEAHY TRUST**) and it is very much appreciated. But we would ask you to think carefully about the items that you donate; these items must be appropriate and suitable for people who are living on the streets. High-heel shoes, cocktail dresses, bikinis, etc. are all items that have been left at the back of our churches and these are **NOT** suitable.

Thank you to Sheila Chamberlain from St Thomas' and Viola Brady and Denise Richards from St Philip and St James' who sort the items and to Viola Brady who liaises with **THE ALICE LEAHY TRUST** and takes the items into them.

Please continue to help—your generosity is much appreciated—but please ensure that you give suitable and appropriate items, as listed above.

doing that, we could help others as well, that would be great. I originally hoped that we might raise  $\notin$ 3,000 and be able to give

€1,000 each to The Irish Cancer Society, Protestant Aid and to our parishes' 'poor' fund. We raised €15,000 which is amazing! It was wonderful to be able to send €5,000 to the Irish Cancer Society and to Protestant Aid—both of whom were very grateful and appreciative to the parishes; and the parishes' 'poor' fund and our parishes benefitted by the remaining €5,000.
