<u>Lighting the Third Candle on the</u> <u>Advent Wreath</u>



Three candles are lit on the Advent Wreath.

In this season of Advent, we are here to watch and wait and pray for the coming of the light into the world. We long for the day when the things of darkness - selfishness and greed, suffering and oppression - shall be no more.

The candles on our Advent Wreath will remind us of the story of how, through the years, through different people, and finally in Jesus Christ, God's Kingdom comes on earth. The first candle is to remind us of the patriarchs (the leaders God sent before Jesus). The second candle is to remind us of the prophets, and now the third candle for John the Baptist, who called people to change their way of living to prepare for the coming of Christ. We light the third candle for all God's messengers, preparing the way for change, signs pointing to a new age to come.

God, as we wait for your promise, give light, give hope.

The light shines in the darkness and the darkness has never put it out. God sent his messenger, a man named John, who came to tell people about the light, so that all should hear the message and believe. [John 1: 5-7]

Disturbing God, we thank you for the witness of John the Baptist. Help us to be open to the changing power of your love, and to be true witnesses to the power of Jesus in our lives. Amen.

<u>Hymn – Three Candles (Frère</u> Jacques)

[Repeat each line] Three candles, burning slow. Advent weeks of waiting, one-and-a-bit to go. Shepherds listening, in the night. Will they hear the angels sing tonight?

<u>The Jesse Tree</u>

The Jesse Tree shows Jesus' family tree. Today, we are putting a shepherd's crook and harp for David, a stone altar for Elijah, an empty tent for Hezekiah, a fire tongs with a hot coal for Isaiah, tears for Jeremiah, a stone watch tower for Habakkuk and a city wall for Nehemiah, on the tree.

6 There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. ⁷He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. ⁸He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. 19 This is the testimony given by John when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, 'Who are you?' ²⁰He confessed and did not deny it, but confessed, 'I am not the Messiah.' ²¹And they asked him, 'What then? Are you Elijah?' He said, 'I am not.' 'Are you the prophet?' He answered, 'No.' ²²Then they said to him, 'Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?' ²³He said, 'I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, "Make straight the way of the Lord" ', as the prophet Isaiah said. 24 Now they had been sent from the Pharisees. ²⁵They asked him, 'Why then are you baptizing if you are neither the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the prophet?' ²⁶John answered them, 'I baptize with water. Among you stands one whom you do not know, ²⁷the one who is coming after me; I am not worthy to untie the thong of

his sandal.' ²⁸This took place in Bethany across the Jordan where John was baptizing.
