## <u>Lighting the First Candle on the</u> <u>Advent Wreath</u>

The Advent wreath, or Advent crown, is a Christian tradition that symbolizes the passage of the four weeks of Advent in the liturgical calendar of the Western church. The Advent Wreath is traditionally a Lutheran practice, albeit it has spread to many other Christian denominations. It is usually a horizontal evergreen wreath with four candles and often, a fifth, white candle in the centre. Beginning with the First Sunday of Advent, the lighting of a candle can be accompanied by a Bible reading and prayers. An additional candle is lit during each subsequent week until, by the last Sunday before Christmas, all four candles are lit. Some Advent wreaths include a fifth, white "Christ" candle which can be lit at Christmas. The custom is observed both in family settings and at public church services.

The ring of the Advent wreath of evergreens decorated with candles was a symbol in northern Europe long before the arrival of Christianity. The circle symbolized the eternal cycle of the seasons while the evergreens and lighted candles signified the persistence of life in the midst of winter. Some sources suggest the wreath—now reinterpreted as a Christian symbol—was in common use in the Middle Ages, others that it was established in Germany as a Christian custom only in the 16th century.

In this season of Advent, we are here to watch and wait and pray for the coming of the light into the world. We long for the day when the things of darkness - selfishness and greed, suffering and oppression - shall be no more, and this year, we long for the day when the coronavirus, COVID-19, shall be no more.

The candles on our Advent Wreath will remind us of the story of how, through the years, through different people, and finally in Jesus Christ, God's Kingdom comes on earth.

The first candle is to remind us of the patriarchs (the leaders God sent before Jesus), and so today, we think of Abraham and Sarah, Isaac and Jacob, Moses and David who God called to be the founders and leaders of his people Israel. **Blessed be God for ever.** 

Abraham and Sarah were promised

that, through their descendants, all the world would be blessed. Blessed be God for ever.

Moses and David, good and faithful leaders of God's people, paved the way for a greater One to follow. **Blessed be God for ever.** 

The first candle is lit.

As we light this first candle, we celebrate the faith of Abraham and Sarah, Isaac and Jacob, Moses and David.

Like them we put our faith in God who fulfilled his promises, by sending his Son Jesus Christ to be the Saviour and King of all. Amen.

## <u>The Jesse Tree</u>

The Jesse Tree represents the family tree, or genealogy of Jesus Christ. It tells the story of God's salvation plan, beginning with creation and continuing through the Old Testament, to the coming of the Messiah. The name comes from Isaiah 11:1, "Then a shoot will spring from the stem of Jesse, and a branch from his roots will bear fruit."

The Jesse Tree shows Jesus' family tree. Today, we are putting a dove for creation, an apple for Adam and Eve, a rainbow and ark for Noah, stars for Abraham, a ram for Isaac and a ladder for Jacob on the tree.

We celebrate as people who are healed by the tenderness and compassion of God; who are blessed by God's power to dispel the darkness of our hearts and minds and souls; who are loved, along with all of God's children, weak and vulnerable, today, and every day. May God hold us in the palm of his hand. Amen.
