We have now received updated guidelines from the government which confirms that very little has changed for places of religious worship; appropriate social distancing is required, masks are to be worn, hard surfaces sanitised, limitations on singing, etc.

Face Masks

As per government guidelines, please wear a face covering in church. Those who are leading/reading at the service may remove their face covering whilst they are leading/reading but must observe social-distancing whilst doing so.

Contact Tracing

We are obliged to get the contact details of everyone who attends this service. These will only be used in the event of someone attending the service being diagnosed with Covid-19, in which event, they will be passed to the health authorities for Contact Tracing purposes. Please complete the form which is available at the church doors and drop into the box provided. If they are not required for Contact Tracing purposes, they will be destroyed after 28 days.

Singing

We have been instructed that while choirs can sing as long as they are socially distanced from each other or that children's choirs operate in pods, that the members of the congregation are not to sing, shout, chant or raise their voices to each other! Over the past few weeks, there has been some 'musical muttering into masks'! The organist, is going to play the tune of the hymns chosen for this service and I invite you to reflect upon the words which have been included in this service sheet as you listen to the music.

A new Church Year begins today. The four weeks of Advent (Latin adventus – coming) are about the coming of God's Kingdom; God's values and God's ways into our world. It is a season of hope in which we look forward to 'the last day when Christ shall come again' to establish that Kingdom on earth. We also look back to those who have figured in the unfolding story of God's coming to rule his people in justice and peace.

<u>Lighting the First Candle on the</u> <u>Advent Wreath</u>

The Advent wreath, or Advent crown, is a Christian tradition that symbolizes the passage of the four weeks of Advent in the liturgical calendar of the Western church. The Advent Wreath is traditionally a Lutheran practice, albeit it has spread to many other Christian denominations. It is usually a horizontal evergreen wreath with four candles and often, a fifth, white candle in the centre. Beginning with the First Sunday of Advent, the lighting of a candle can be accompanied by a Bible reading and prayers. An additional candle is lit during each subsequent week until, by the last Sunday before Christmas, all four candles are lit. Some Advent wreaths include a fifth, white "Christ" candle which can be lit at Christmas. The custom is observed both in family settings and at public church services.

The ring of the Advent wreath of evergreens decorated with candles was a symbol in northern Europe long before the arrival of Christianity. The circle symbolized the eternal cycle of the seasons while the evergreens and lighted candles signified the persistence of life in the midst of winter. Some sources suggest the wreath—now reinterpreted as a Christian symbol—was in common use in the Middle Ages, others that it was established in Germany as a Christian custom only in the 16th century.

In this season of Advent, we are here to watch and wait and pray for the coming of the light into the world. We long for the day when the things of darkness - selfishness and greed, suffering and oppression - shall be no

more. The candles on our Advent Wreath will remind us of the story of how, through the years, through different people, and finally in Jesus Christ, God's Kingdom comes on earth.

The first candle is to remind us of the patriarchs (the leaders God sent before Jesus), and so today, we think of Abraham and Sarah, Isaac and Jacob, Moses and David who God called to be the founders and leaders of his people Israel.

Blessed be God for ever.

Abraham and Sarah were promised that, through their descendants, all the world would be blessed.

Blessed be God for ever.

Moses and David, good and faithful leaders of God's people, paved the way for a greater One to follow.

Blessed be God for ever.

The first candle is lit.

As we light this first candle, we celebrate the faith of Abraham and Sarah, Isaac and Jacob, Moses and David.

Like them we put our faith in God who fulfilled his promises by sending his Son Jesus Christ to be the Saviour and King of all. Amen.

The Jesse Tree

The Jesse Tree represents the family tree, or genealogy of Jesus Christ. It tells the story of God's salvation plan, beginning with creation and continuing through the Old Testament, to the coming of the Messiah. The name comes from Isaiah 11:1, "Then a shoot will spring from the stem of Jesse, and a branch from his roots will bear fruit."

The Jesse Tree shows Jesus' family tree. Today, we are putting a dove for creation, an apple for Adam and Eve, a rainbow and ark for Noah, stars for Abraham, a ram for Isaac and a ladder for Jacob on the tree.
