At a meeting of both select vestries on Monday 24th January 2022, it was decided, in light of the numbers of COVID cases and the concerns expressed by parishioners, to continue with the current measures and service times until the end of February when there will be a further full review. Your opinions on how we go forward would be welcome and will be taken into consideration at that review.

Face Masks

The government guidelines still require us to wear a face mask in church, covering your mouth and nose. It has been indicated that this will be reviewed at the end of February. Those who are leading/reading at the service may remove their face covering whilst they are leading/reading.

Social Distancing

The government has announced that social- distancing is no longer required, however, a number of people have indicated that they would still like to have a little space. There is always plenty of space at the front of the church!!! I would ask people to respect others' need for space.

To communicate widely, knowledge of Motor Neurone Disease and related disorders in order to raise awareness in the wider community.

Blackrock Hospice

For almost 20 years, Blackrock Hospice has been operating from its base in Sweetman's Avenue.

During 2022, Our Lady's Hospice & Care Services is investing in significant renovations.

This work will ensure that Blackrock
Hospice meets the needs of the community
now and for the future. These changes will
make real improvements to the care
provided by Blackrock Hospice. However,
the Hospice is closed during the renovation
period which will have no impact on those
being looked after in their own homes by
the Home Care Team;

Out-patient appointments will be provided in 203 Merrion Road;

In-patients will be accommodated in either Harold's Cross or Wicklow Hospice according to their preference and availability.

The project will cost in the region of €6.5 million in fundraised income for which there is a current shortfall of €2 million.
