### CHRISTMAS 2023 NEWSLETTER

My apologies that there was no Autumn 2023 Newsletter. I had a horrible dose of gastric 'flu' which completely floored me for about two weeks and which took about five weeks to fully recover from. My thanks to Diocesan Lay Reader and former parishioner Uta Raab for taking the services on Sunday 10th September 2023—it was much appreciated.

It has been a busy summer and autumn with work being carried out in both churches, the Start-of-the-School-Year Service which was combined with the Harvest Thanksgiving at the end of September in St



Philip and St James' Church. Then it was the Autumn Fair on the second Saturday in October. On the first and third Sundays of November, we remembered our loves ones by the lighting of candles and reading out their names whilst others remembered silently. On the second Sunday of November, we remembered all who have died in world war and conflict, and remembered particularly the forty-one men and one woman from the three churches that make up our parishes, who died in the first world war and the four men who died in the second world war. In the midst of remembering and hoping that the world would have learnt that the human cost of war is unacceptable, we were praying earnestly for peace as the horrors of war and conflict are all too real and we read, hear and see in the media, about Ukraine, Palestine and Israel.

Every life is important. Every life matters. In the story of Jesus' birth, in the choice of Mary and Joseph to be a part of Jesus' family, in the choice of the shepherds who were considered so untrustworthy that they could not be witnesses in a court of law, in the choice of the wisemen, exotic, foreign, different, we see a God to whom every life—even the lives that people considered unimportant - mattered and every life matters now. In a small way, we can show that every life matters... by carol singing in aid of the Dublin SIMON Community—see page 8; helping Santa along with the Capuchin Day Centre and the Alice Leahy Trust—see page 9 and 10; helping the work of Protestant Aid –see page 8. Then we really are *doing* Christmas.

We welcome Christ as the Prince of Peace, the Wonderful Counsellor... and we need that peace and that negotiating ability and listening now... and pray for those who have international influence that they may use it for the greater good and not to serve their own agendas.

Thank you to all who have worked so hard in our parish communities over the past year to make a difference in a myriad of ways: the Select Vestries, Churchwardens, Glebewardens, Secretaries, Treasurers, Safeguarding Trust Panel members; those who clean the churches, arrange flowers, decorate the churches, welcome people, read, make tea and coffee, cook sausages and wedges, manage halls/parish centres, fix and mend things, co-ordinate reading rotas, do Sunday Club, etc.

Thank you one and all!

# Sunday 24<sup>th</sup> December 2023 - Christmas Eve In the morning of Christmas Eve, there will be an 8.30 Service of Holy Communion in St Philip and St

James' Church, and 'A Quiet Christmas' in St Thomas' Church at 10.30. This is a service specially designed for those who may want a more meditative approach to Christmas, or who, for differing



On Christmas Day, there will be the usual services to celebrate Christmas:







### **CAROLS for PROTESTANT AID**



Over the past years and with the increased cost of living this winter, we have been very conscious of the demands on Protestant Aid, which is a Protestant version of St Vincent de Paul. It does not differentiate between creed or ethnicity regarding those who it helps... although the name can be misleading. They are doing amazing work, helping families of all backgrounds and origins who are finding things tough.

To support their work, we will have a collection at the Carols by Candlelight Service in St Thomas' Church at 19.00 hours, on Sunday 17th December 2023, for Protestant Aid. The proceeds of the carol singing in the Blackrock Village Shopping Centre, will go to Dublin SIMON, and the collection from the Sunday night will go to Protestant Aid.

**Protestant Aid** helps families and individuals who are very much in need of financial assistance, and this situations arise from all sorts of circumstances: the economic down turn, ill-health, marriage breakdown, etc. They are often 'invisible', coping with acute financial stress caused by mounting debts or redundancy, and family pressures with little or no State aid.

Please note this appeal is <u>not only</u> to raise awareness of those in need, <u>but also</u> to make those in need aware that assistance is available.

Applications, which are means tested, may be made through the Rector or directly to Protestant Aid.

### **HELP FOR SANTA**



### **REGISTER OF VESTRYPERSONS**



The Register of Vestrypersons is the 'electoral roll' of the parish. If you wish to be able to vote on parish matters, or in elections, such as at the Easter General Vestry, or if you wish to hold office in the parish as a churchwarden, glebewarden, member of the Select Vestry, Parochial Nominator or Diocesan Synodsperson, than you have to be on the Register of Vestrypersons.

It is very simple to do, the Churchwardens have forms available, and all you have to do is fill in the short, simple form, sign it, and give it to a Churchwarden.

The Register is updated at the January Select Vestry meetings of our respective parishes. You may not be on more than one Register at any one time, so if you have moved recently and you wish to be included on the Register in one of our parishes, but you are already on the Register of Vestrypersons elsewhere, you would need to request your previous parish to have your name removed from their Register.

Being on the Register gives you the right to vote, it gives you a say in the decision-making process of our church— democracy is an important part of the Church of Ireland—cherish that right.

Currently, our representative bodies do not reflect the membership of the church and it is an issue that we are being encouraged to address. In order to be able to have the option to respond to that motion, we need a wide variety of people to 'sign-up' for the Register of Vestrypersons.

If you want to have your say and be able to vote, you have to be on the Register of Vestrypersons...

#### THE ALICE LEAHY TRUST

TRUST, now known as THE ALICE LEAHY TRUST continues to do extraordinary work in difficult circumstances.

Our two parishes have an ongoing working relationship with **The Alice Leahy Trust. TRUST** was founded in 1975 and since then has been working with people who are homeless in Dublin. It is a non-political, non-denominational voluntary body which provides medical and related services for people who are homeless, operating out of a premises provided at a nominal rent by the Iveagh

Trust. Up to 50 men (mostly men) and women call each morning, the majority of whom are sleeping out (aged 18 to 85 years). They need the following items:



#### MEN'S CLOTHING ....

Hoodies; jeans; track-suit bottoms; jumpers; water-proof jackets; long-johns (underwear—must be new); strong, sturdy shoes (preferably runners)

#### THEY ALSO NEED ....



pot noodles (preferably chicken); pot curries (preferably chicken); cup-a-soups; mini-bars (chocolate, etc.); toiletries (shampoo, shower gel, toothpaste, toothbrushes, female hygiene products)

The items can be left at the back of either of the churches and they will then be taken into The Alice Leahy Trust.

Parishioners have been very generous over the years and it is very much appreciated. But we would ask you to think carefully about the items that you donate; these items must be appropriate and suitable for people who are living on the streets. High-heel shoes, cocktail dresses, bikinis, etc. are all items that have been left at the back of our churches and these are **NOT** suitable.

Thank you to Sheila Chamberlain from St Thomas' and Viola Brady and Denise Richards from St Philip and St James' who sort the items and to Viola Brady who liaises with The Alice Leahy Trust and takes the items into them.

Please continue to help—your generosity is much appreciated—but please ensure that you give suitable and appropriate items, as listed above.

The Reading for Fun Programme encourages the children to read to a special reading 'friend' – in this case an Irish Therapy Dog. The dog is a captive audience who does or criticise them, programe to the programme and program and p

not judge or criticise them, never laughs at mistakes and so makes reading an enjoyable activity for them. The children relax while reading to the dog and this gives them the confidence needed to read aloud. With improvement in their literacy and communication skills their self esteem and confidence grows.

In July, Booterstown National School ran its first summer programme for children who attend learning support. It was great fun as children did arts and crafts, science experiments, cooking and day trips. Over the summer we improved the storage in our GP room and senior classes and the revamp looks great. #### HEATING and ALTERATIONS PROJECT in ST PHILP and ST JAMES' CHURCH



The works on St Philip and St James' Church have continued this year with the more major projects being the re-painting of the church, the arrival of new chairs and the refurbishment of the pews and wood panelling. The redecoration of the nave and transepts was a huge task. Scaffolding was required which added to the overall

demands of the task. We had to use paint that was especially made to reflect the type of the paint that would have been used in the early stag-

es of the church, and the ceiling alone required six coats of paint so that the filling and making good of areas did not show through. We said 'goodbye' to the various shades of powderpuff pink that had been on the walls and painted the walls an 'oatmeal' colour with the back

(west) wall in a green. The two photos on the lefthand side of this page will give you an idea of the changes and of how it looks now.

The overall effect is one that is calming and peaceful and the features of the church such as the chancel, stained glass windows and the mosaic on the back wall are enhanced.

The new chairs arrived in the autumn and they are beautiful with the parish logo carved into the back-rest—see the photos. Thank you to those who have donated or sponsored a chair—over 50% of the chairs have been gifted. Many of the donated chairs are in memory of a loved one. Thank you to those who have done that. The plaques are currently being final-ised and will be going on the chairs in early 2024. Irish Contract Seating (ICS) who supplied the chairs informed us that they were getting a new machine for the plaques and advised us to wait as the new machine would do a better job, so we are waiting! Quentin Teggin has been contacting the donors of the chairs to clarify their inscription. However, please note that the plaque will be small and that the maximum number of characters – NB, characters, not words, and a space counts as a character! - is 50-55. There are still some chairs available - the cost of a chair is €275 (including the brass

plaque and engraving). If you would like more information about donating or sponsoring a chair, please contact the Honorary Treasurer, Quentin Teggin at qteggin@gmail.com or the Rector. The remaining pews are being refurbished along

with the wooden panelling and the improvement is amazing! The pews and the wooden panelling in the nave will be finished before Christmas and the pews and wooden panelling in the transepts will be done in January. Some damp was found in the North Porch and in the Vestry and remedial works have been carried out and when the plaster is dry, the painters will return to complete the redecoration of those areas.

I cannot begin to calculate the hours that the two glebewardens have put into this project. When workmen finish up on a Friday night, Gordon Richards and Mike Hayes are in the church, sorting everything to make sure that we can use it for Sunday services. If there are services or occasions during the week, they



are in there, moving furniture, cleaning, etc. They, along with the Select Vestry given great attention to every detail. The decisions on the colour of the walls and the wood stain and upholstery on the chairs were only made following mammoth discussions!

The church has become a much more tranquil and comfortable place in which to worship, and more flexible for a variety of activities such as confirmation class, concerts, social gatherings, etc. As we prepare to celebrate 200 years of worship in the church, our hope and prayer is that it will continue to serve the parish community and the wider community and be a place where people may encounter the presence of God.

#### HEATING and SOUND SYSTEM in ST THOMAS' CHURCH

Over the summer, St Thomas' Church was a busy site as work was done on the heating system and the sound system. St Thomas' Church is heated by four storage heaters and by oil-filled radiators that are run on electricity. We looked at all the possible alternatives from gas-fired central heating, to smart heaters, to radiant pendant heaters, to climate-controlled heating, to air to water heat exchangers. After much research and discussion with the heating and mechanical engineer, it was agreed to leave the oil-filled radiators in the system and to replace the four storage heaters, of which only two were working and they were only partially working. It was also agreed to install two small destratifiers which gently (and most importantly, quietly!) push the warm air back down to where it is needed, at human being level! The work was undertaken during the summer and we now have a much warmer and cosier church eventhough the heating is on for less than it would have been previously.

The sound system was also overhauled. Parishioners were complaining that they couldn't hear and that there was a lot of 'feedback' and 'background' noise on the system. Thank you to Dylan Rynhart, Mike Hayes (St Philip and St James' People's Glebewarden) and Graham Hayes, all of whom not only look after such things in St Philip and St James' Church but who discovered what the problem was, researched what was needed and installed the new equipment in St Thomas' Church too. People are now able to hear everything loud and clear!

The mechanics or action of the organ at St Thomas' Church has been heavy and clunky for many years. It was decided to see if it could be improved. We had exploratory visits and quotes from two organ builders and Stephen Adams has worked magic on the organ! Springs have been released or eased and the pressure was raised to coax a little more power out of it.

All of this work was able to be undertaken, thanks to a very generous donation from the Montgomery Charitable Trust and a very generous bequest from the late Canon Bill Heney,

The Scout Shed roof was also replaced during the summer, and particular thanks to the Scout Group Honorary Treasurer Peter Marshall, who researched and successfully applied for a grant for the work. The Scout Group equipment is now stored in dry conditions which will prolong its life significantly.

Thank you to Denis Beare, the Glebewarden on Mount Merrion Select Vestry who keeps on everything with regard to property.

St Thomas' Church is preparing to celebrate 150 years of worship in the church, and we too are discussing and reflecting how the little church on the corner and the parish may serve the parish and beyond in the years to come.

### UNITED SERVICE FOR DAFFODIL DAY



For the past number of years, following on from the Daffodil Coffee Morning held for many years by Florrie Halliday, we have held a Daffodil Service followed by a Coffee Morning in aid of the Irish Cancer Society on the fourth Sunday of March. Due to COVID, we were not able to hold the Daffodil Service for two years and we really appreciated being able to do so again in 2022 and 2023. We always have it on the fourth Sunday of March which is near Daffodil Day and at the service which will be at 10.30 in St Philip and St James' Church, we will be praying for those who are undergoing treatment for cancer, and for all who are involved in the healing and care of people with cancer; for those undertaking research into the treatment and cure of cancer; giving thanks for the re-

covery of those who have survived cancer, and remembering those who have died from cancer. In 2024, the fourth Sunday of March will also be Palm Sunday.

Afterwards, there will be a coffee morning in aid of the Irish Cancer Society which will take place in the parish hall.

# 2024

#### It's going to be a big one!!

In 2024, we will celebrate and mark the 200th anniversary of the consecration of St Philip and St James' Church which took place on 16th May 1824. The Parish of Booterstown had been founded three years earlier in

1821 as it was carved out of the Parish of Donnybrook. The Parish of Booterstown was united with the Parish of Christ Church, Carysfort in 1943. On Sunday 19th May 2024, there will be a special united service at 10.30 in St

Philip and St James' Church to celebrate the 200th anniversary of the consecration of the church. The Archbishop of Dublin, the Most Rev. Michael Jackson, will preside at that Service of Holy Communion and the Archbishop of Armagh, the Most Rev. John McDowell will preach. The Ad Hoc Choir will be





singing at this service and the Stedfast Band will also be playing. There will be other events too during the year to mark this special occasion.

> 2024 will also be a special year in the life of St Thomas' Church as we mark and celebrate the 150th anniversary of the consecration of St Thomas' Church on 21st December 1874. St Thomas' Day, up to about 60 years ago, was on 21st December but possibly because it got 'lost' in the run-up to Christmas and possibly because St Thomas features most in the questions that he has after Jesus' resurrection, his day was transferred to 3rd July. The Select Vestry decided that it would not be feasible to mark the 150th anniversary

> four days before Christmas so they have chosen to have a special service on the Sunday close to St Thomas' Day and there will be a special united service

at 10.30 in St Thomas' Church on Sunday 30th June 2024. The Archbishop of Dublin, the Most Rev. Michael Jackson will be preside at that Service of Holy Communion and the Rev. Ruth Elmes will preach. Ruth Elmes' late mother Janet was a Hipwell. She was a first cousin of Canon Trevor Hipwell but the families were close. Trevor has the distinction of being the first rector of the Parish of Mount Merrion, and the only rector of Mount Merrion as a parish on its own. It was carved out of Taney Parish in 1956 and his Institution on 24th June that year marked the beginning of the Parish of Mount Merrion. On Trevor's re-

tirement in 1994, the grouping of the Parish of Mount Merrion with the Parish of Booterstown and Carysfort began and the subsequent rectors of Mount Merrion have also been the rectors of Booterstown and Carysfort. Interestingly, Mount Merrion Parish is the only parish that

Trevor was ever rector of; he only served one incumbency and that was in Mount Merrion Parish. Hence, Trevor has a unique place in the history of St Thomas' Church and it is a church that is much loved by the extended Hipwell family. Again, the Ad Hoc Choir will be singing at this service and the Stedfast Band will also be playing. Other events are also being planned to mark the 150th anniversary.

It is hoped that the clergy and lay readers who have previously been connected with one or both parishes will visit and preach during 2024. There are quite a few, at least

twelve come to mind!

Michael Lee has done a fantastic job on researching the history of the parishes. Whilst we might have two churches, our history takes in five parishes: Booterstown, Mount Merrion, Carysfort, Taney and Mount Merrion and that is a lot of research, and needless to say, Mike did it diligently. Thank you to all those who gave of their time to be interviewed by Mike. We look forward to the book being published next year.

Details of other events and occasions to celebrate these significant milestones in our parishes will be revealed in 2024. In the meantime, put the above dates in your diary! We would love you to be involved.

#### LENTEN 2023 CHALLENGE


