# NEWSLETTER

So much has changed since the last parish newsletter was printed in mid-November 2019.

Due to the coronavirus Covid-19, our lives have changed utterly. The restrictions in place at this time have never been experienced before and even those who would remember World War 2, say that this is very different. During the World Wars, people could still meet and connect, and in fact, the camaraderie built between people within their communities at that time was the thing that helped them to get through. Worship still continued and gathering together to pray for their loved ones serving overseas in the armed forces or in the nursing corps, helped them to turn to their faith and to cope with all that was going on; it was essential to their wellbeing.

To be disconnected and isolated from each other is very strange, and not to be able to reach out and be in each other's presence at a time of difficulty is very counter-cultural to us. Technology has allowed us to connect but I am very conscious that many of our older parishioners do not have computers or smartphones and so cannot meet up via Zoom, or connect through social media or by email. Phone calls and talking to each other is so important, and even for those who text or email, to hear a voice and have a conversation means so much more and is much more personal. Thank you to those parishioners who keep in touch with others by phone and especially those whose only means of having a chat is through the phone. Thank you to too to those who have offered to do shopping, pharmacy pick-ups, etc for those who are cocooning.

I am very grateful to Michael Lee, who as a recently retired camera-man from RTÉ is able to look at things with a professional eye, and has been helping me to record the short services that go up on the parishes' website Facebook pages, and my own Facebook page Sunday, and the reflections which will be 'up' each evening during Holy Week. I am also very grateful to Graham Hayes, who posts the videos on the parishes' website, and who worked on the Front Page to make it more easily accessible and who, indeed, will be posting this newsletter onto our website! As I am very limited technically, it is fantastic to have people in the parishes with this expertise and who are so willing to help.

We have had two select vestry meetings—one for each select vestry—by via Zoom which worked pretty well, and I am looking at other ways that we could use Zoom for our parishes at this time.

As Christians, we are an Easter people... but that does not mean that we deny or glossover the reality of devastation; it means that we look we look to a new dawn, a new era, in times of hardship and pain. The horror of Good Friday is real, but so too, is the

light, hope and possibility of Easter Day. We look for God in the darkness and the devastation; we strive to be the voice of God and the action of God in times of difficulty, to help transform the darkness into light and hope. As in this photo taken at the ecumenical Sonrise at dawn on Sandymount Strand, we look to the Sonrise for newness and for life.

#### In Memoriam

Marjorie Rosemary (Jill) Hipwell (née Pringle) died on Monday 25<sup>th</sup> November 2019 in Brabazon House. Jill's late husband, Canon Trevor Hipwell was Rector of Mount Merrion (1956-1994), and the Hipwell legacy in St Thomas' Church is still felt in the parish. It was because of the contribution by the Hipwells to the life of the Parish of Mount Merrion that it was decided to rename the St Thomas' Rectory as Hipwell House last year. Jill's funeral service was conducted by the Rev. Canon Roy Byrne – as the Rector was away – in St Thomas' Church and the Ven. Ruth Elmes – a relative of Canon Hipwell – preached.

Pauline Elizabeth Sylvia Barr (née Johnston) died on Saturday 7<sup>th</sup> December 2019 in Newtownpark Nursing Home. Over their twentyseven years in St Philip and St James' Church, Osborne and Pauline made a significant and lasting impact on the parish, and Pauline, through her teaching in Glengara touched the lives of her pupils. Pauline's funeral took place in Christ Church Dun Laoghaire, led by the Rector, the Rev. Ása Björk Ólafsdóttir, assisted by the Rev. Canon Gillian Wharton and lay reader Alan Rhodes. Pauline's ashes were interred in in St Thomas' Garden of Remembrance, by the Rector of Dun Laoghaire, the Rev. Ása Björk Ólafsdóttir, on Wednesday 12<sup>th</sup> February 2020.

**Marjorie Honor Stuart** died on Thursday 12<sup>th</sup> December 2019 in St Vincent's University Hospital. Honor, who would have been 102 years old on 17<sup>th</sup> January 2020, moved to Brabazon House in May 2019. Not only was she a remarkable



age, but was healthy in every way until the day before her death. Honor did not 'do old age'; she had "no time to be old" and she continued to grab life by both hands and seize every opportunity to travel, explore and try new things. At the age of 94, whilst on an archaeological dig, she jumped across a trench, fell and broke her hip. Rather than let this get the best of her, Honor was instructing others in the Rehab Department of the Royal Hospital Donnybrook how to do

their exercises!!! She taught in Alexandra College for her entire teaching career and she was ever the teacher, whether it was instructing her fellow-hippees in the Royal Hospital Donnybrook or the Rector on her grammar or Irish! She was delighted to receive so many cards and greetings for her 100th birthday and wrote a Thank You to every single person who sent her a birthday wish, and she really enjoyed the special

service held in St Thomas' Church for her 100th birthday and the reception afterwards—see photo. She really was an extraordinary woman!

Honor's brother Robert died in England on 1<sup>st</sup> December 2019 and his funeral took place on Wednesday 18<sup>th</sup> December 2019, which meant that Honor's funeral was not held until Saturday 21<sup>st</sup> December 2019 in St Thomas' Church. Her funeral service was followed by cremation in Mount Jerome. Honor's ashes were interred in St Thomas' Garden of

Remembrance, on Sunday 19<sup>th</sup> January 2020, two days after what would have been Honor's 102<sup>nd</sup> birthday.

## **GENERAL SYNOD**

This year, the General Synod was due to meet in Croke Park, Dublin, on Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> May, Friday 8<sup>th</sup> May and Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> May 2020. But like everything else, this has had to be postponed. There is no date yet for the re-scheduled General Synod 2020. This year is the final session of the Triennium, which means that those who were elected by the members of the respective Diocesan Synods in 2017, will finish a three-year-term, 2018-2020 inclusive.

The clergy of each Diocese elect a representative number of clergy to General Synod, and the laity of each Diocese elect two laypersons for every clerical member. The clergy of Dublin Diocese elect eighteen clergy to General Synod, and the laity of Dublin elect thirty-six laypersons to General Synod; Glendalough Diocese elect four clergy and eight laity to General Synod.

The Rector has been a member of General Synod for a number of years and Stephanie Morris who is a member of Booterstown and Carysfort Select Vestry, was elected to General Synod in 2017.

## LETTERS of REFERENCE and WITNESSING of SIGNATURES

Clergy are frequently asked to write letters of reference; to complete forms of reference; or to witness signatures. Some forms (including school application forms and SEC grant forms) are quite specific in what they ask, such as...

> is the person/child is personally known to the rector; does the person/child attend the church;

or clergy are asked to confirm that the person/child is a member of the parish, etc.

As I am sure you can appreciate, it is important that the information given is accurate and true.


## **BLESSING OF THE ANIMALS**

## **ARCHBISHOP-ELECT OF ARMAGH**



The Rt Revd John McDowell, Bishop of Clogher, has been elected by the House of Bishops as the new Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All-Ireland. He succeeds Archbishop Richard Clarke who retired on 2nd February this year.

Bishop McDowell (aged 64) was ordained in 1996 and has served as Bishop of Clogher since 2011. He was previously Rector of St Mark's, Dundela, in East Belfast (2002–2011), Rector of Ballyrashane (1999–2002), and Curate of Antrim (1996–1999). He has also served as an Honorary Secretary of the General Synod (2008–2011) and is currently Chairman of the Church of Ireland's Commission for Christian Unity and Dialogue.

Speaking on his election, Bishop McDowell said: 'I am overwhelmed by the confidence which my fellow bishops have placed in me to fill this ancient office. I look forward to working with them in the time to come and to serving the people of the Diocese of Armagh and the Church of Ireland in whatever way I can.'

The translation will take effect from Tuesday, 28th April 2020, and the enthronement date will be announced in due course. Upon taking up his responsibilities as Archbishop of Armagh, Bishop McDowell will be the 106th in the succession of abbots, bishops and archbishops of Armagh since St Patrick.

## **BISHOP-ELECT OF CONNOR**

On 17<sup>th</sup> February 2020, the Episcopal Electoral College for the Diocese of Connor elected Archdeacon George Davison as the new Bishop of Connor. He succeeds the Rt Revd Alan Abernethy who retired at the end of December 2019.

The Venerable George Davison is the Archdeacon of Belfast in the Diocese of Connor, Rector of St Nicholas' Church, Carrickfergus, and an Honorary Secretary of the Church of Ireland's General Synod. He was previously Archdeacon of Kilmore and Rector of Kinawley, in the Diocese of Kilmore, Elphin and Ardagh.


The Rt Revd Patrick Rooke, President of the Electoral College and Bishop of Tuam, Killala and Achonry, said: 'I congratulate Archdeacon George Davison on his election as Bishop of Connor. I am confident that he will be a popular choice and a wise and caring leader in a diocese he knows well. I look forward to working alongside him in the wider Church and wish him well as he prepares for this new phase of ministry.'



The bishop-elect said: 'The members of the Electoral College for the Diocese of Connor have done me a great honour in electing me to serve as the next bishop of the diocese. I am very conscious of the great responsibility that is being entrusted to me. I am immensely thankful for the gifted colleagues who serve the Church in Connor Diocese and look forward to serving with them as we seek to share the Good News of Jesus Christ in the years ahead.'

It is hoped that George will be consecrated as a bishop in St Patrick's Cathedral Armagh on 1st May 2020 which is St Philip and St James' Day, however, this looks very unlikely at present and the consecration may have to be postponed to a later date.

Booterstown and Carysfort Easter General Vestry on Thursday 30th April 2020 in the Canon Osborne Barr Room of St Philip and St James' Parish Centre

Needless to say, whether these go ahead or not on the scheduled dates is very uncertain. Under the constitution of the Church of Ireland, the last date for holding an Easter General Vestry this year is Saturday 2nd May 2020, but we may hold a meeting by that date and adjourn it until Monday 18th May 2020.

But the Chartities Regulatory Authority, have said that our charitable status will not be affected if we do not comply with our own regulations due to Covid-19. Those currently serving as Churchwardens, Glebewardens, Select Vestry members, Parochial Nominators (and Supplementalists) and Diocesan Synodspersons (and Supplementalists) remain in place until such time as an Easter General Vestry meeting for a parish may be held.

# **GDPR—PARISHES' PRIVACY POLICY**

As you are aware, regulation with regards to the holding and storing of personal information came into force on 25<sup>th</sup> May 2018. Thank you to those who have returned completed forms, but we do still have some outstanding forms to be returned.

Therefore, we now need to ask that you opt into our communications system so that we may continue to contact you, hold your details and count you among our number.

## THE ALICE LEAHY TRUST

TRUST, now known as THE ALICE LEAHY TRUST continues to do extraordinary work in difficult circumstances.

In our two parishes, we have an ongoing working relationship with **THE ALICE LEAHY TRUST. TRUST** was founded in 1975 as a private charitable trust (Charity No. CHY7014), and since then has been working with people who are homeless in Dublin. It is a non-political, non-denominational voluntary body which provides medical and related services for people who are homeless, operating out of a premises provided at a nominal rent by the Iveagh Trust. Up to 50 men (mostly men) and women call each morning, the majority of whom are

sleeping out (aged 18 to 85 years).



## COVID 19 – FINANCIAL CONSEQUENCES FOR BOTH PARISHES

These are difficult times for everyone and our thoughts and prayers are with those who have been stricken by Covid-19, and the doctors, nurses and healthcare staff who are tending to them. Heroes all.

The consequences of the "lock-in" are wide ranging and many parishioners will be feeling the pinch as their income suffers in a contracting economy.

Our parishes are by no means immune, and the ban on social gatherings has seen parochial revenue from both Parish Centres virtually dry up overnight. As such we are more reliant than ever on contributions from parishioners.

With no Church services for the foreseeable future, this revenue has also largely ceased to flow and, with outgoings remaining largely unchanged, both parishes are now running significant deficits.

While conscious that some households may be financially strapped themselves, it would be much appreciated if those who can afford to, and have the facility to do so through online banking, would either:

make a monthly transfer of an amount equal to what you would have put on the plate or in your envelope on the plate if there had been a church service

or

set up a Standing Order or recurring online bank transfer for a monthly amount through your online banking.

In either instance, we should be obliged if you would include your name and where relevant, your envelope number, under the payment reference. Please also advise the relevant honorary treasurer as reference numbers can get lost on occasion.
