This time, last year, I wrote about how we had had two select vestry meetings via Zoom and that I would look at other ways that we could use Zoom for the couple of months that we would be in lockdown! How naive! We are now so familiar with so many things happen via Zoom: select vestry meetings, Christian Meditation on a Tuesday afternoon, the Wednesday morning Midweek Prayer and Chat, the Midweek Lenten Reflection, etc., etc.

Worship has continued via our webcam. It was lovely to have people in church for three weeks in December and especially on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day, but we really missed being able to sing together. Since Christmas, our services have been online only. I am indebted to all who contribute to the online services and make them possible: Graham Hayes who does the IT and webcam each Sunday at 10.30 and records the Sausage(less!) Service once a month, all of which are 'broadcast' on our parishes' Youtube page; his dad Mike Hayes is his chief assistant and he, and my husband, Alan Rowden, do the scripture readings on alternate Sundays, so that we are not increasing the number of households in the church; Charles Pearson, our organist, who is so talented and so obliging.

His musical talent adds so much to our services and his playing of the organ for our Midweek Musical Treats is so appreciated by those who listen and view them on our website, parishes' Youtube page or Facebook pages. The Midweek Musical Treats would not happen without the time, skill and effort of Mike Lee, who films and records them, adding in other appropriate footage. At the time of writing this, we have posted 68 Midweek Musical Treats. All of this has been going on with strict observance and adherence to the COVID-19 restrictions. When we were under easier restrictions last summer, we were able to include footage from a greater variety of places, including St Thomas' Church, but that has not been possible under the current level of restrictions.

Both churches were beautifully decorated for Christmas and thank you to all those who were involved in that and who put up the Christmas trees. St Philip and St James' Church has continued to be beautifully decorated throughout this lockdown, and many who tune-in to the services have commented upon it. Traditionally, we do not have flowers in our churches for Advent and Lent, as they are seasons of penitence, and it also gives our flower arrangers a break. Denise Richards and Viola Brady offered to do a Lenten display in St Philip and St James' Church, and it is evocative, atmospheric, poignant and beautiful. It is such a pity that only the five of us who are there each week, and Mike Lee who is there once a month get to see it. Hence, I am including lots of photos of the displays in this newsletter so that you can see them too. Vi Wilson, has once again, created a beautiful Easter floral cross for St Thomas' Church, and it will be up on the porch gate, to let passersby know that Easter still happens, and that we, as a Christian community, still celebrate Easter, eventhough we cannot gather physically in our churches. We hope too that its beauty and bright colours will lift the spirits of all who see it.

Last year, we celebrated Easter, looking forward to a newness of life and restoration after what we thought would be a couple of months of restrictions and devastation. This year, we are having to dig deeper to be an Easter people, to be a people of hope., to look forward to a new era, and to be part of that hope by our actions and our words, to lift ourselves and others. May God give us strength and perseverance.

CHRISTIAN MEDITATION



St Philip and St James' Parish has been running its Christian Meditation group since 2012. This has continued on Zoom since early 2020, at the start of the Coronavirus Pandemic. We meet on Zoom at 3.30pm for a short, prepared talk from WCCM (The World Community for Christian Meditation) on a CD, followed by 20 minutes meditation. We have found that continuing meditation on Zoom adds structure to our day, and our week, and helps us to keep up our meditation practice. It is especially helpful for those who live alone and perhaps feel more isolated during these challenging times. People are happy to see familiar faces each week and we always have time for a

chat! Those who are not familiar or confident using Zoom or computers can also participate. They receive a reminder by text message, Whatsapp message or a phone call in advance, and are supported with their meditation practice. We are all looking forward to meeting in person again when it is permitted and safe to do so. However, Zoom has added a new dimension to the practise of meditation. It is appreciated by those who may not be part of a group, have no group near them, or those who may not be able to attend for other reasons. Everyone is welcome to join. THE REV. SUZANNE HARRIS



The Rev. Suzanne Harris, who was the part-time Non-Stipendiary Curate here from 2009-2020, has been appointed by the Archbishop to look after the parishes of Castlemacadam (Avoca) with Ballinatone (Ballinaclash) and Aughrim. The previous rector, the Rev. Canon George Butler retired in June 2018.

As you know, Suzanne left us in January 2020 to undertake a course of study to move from the non-stipendiary ministry to the stipendiary ministry.

Suzanne will be doing her new role in a part-time capacity until the end of the academic year, as she is still the Chaplain in Newpark, School. However, she has announced that she will be retiring from Newpark School at the end of this academic year, and at that stage, Suzanne will become the Priest-in-Charge of those parishes, working full-time in stipendiary ministry.

It is anticipated that the parishes will go through the process of appointing a rector in a few years, and therefore, Suzanne will have the possibility of becoming the Rector at that stage, should she and the parishes wish that.

We are delighted for her and we know how blessed
Castlemacadam, Ballinatone and Aughrim are to have her looking
after them. I was speaking to a parishioner of Castlemacadam
recently and they said "We cannot believe that we have got
someone the calibre of the Rev. Suzanne Harris. It has been worth
the wait to get her!"

We wish her every blessing on this new chapter of her ministry.

THE REV. ROSS STYLES

Congratulations and best wishes to the Rev. Ross Styles who was instituted as the Incumbent of Newcastle, Newtownmountkennedy with Calary on Friday 12th February 2021. The service was live-streamed from Newcastle Church. Usually, at an Institution, there is a large congregation present to welcome the new rector and to pledge their support, but, of course, with the COVID-19 restrictions, there was no congregation apart from the churchwardens. Despite this, Ross and his family have been warmly welcomed by the parishioners.

Ross, his wife Fiona and their children Ben and Ava, were members of these parishes until his Ordination to the Diaconate in 2015. He then served his internship in Greystones Parish, and in 2017, he was ordained to the Priesthood and served as Curate in Christ Church Cathedral Group of Parishes. Ben and Ava are pupils in

Booterstown National School and are remaining in the school until the summer, as it would be very hard to move to a new school in the middle or home-schooling and remote learning. Again, we have had the privilege of experiencing the talents and skills of Ross, and know how blessed Newcastle,

Newtownmountkennedy and Calary are to have him as their Rector. We will miss Ben and Ava, Fiona and Ross as part of our school community but wish them every happiness and blessing in this new chapter in their lives.



THE REV. ARTHUR BARRETT

The Rev. Arthur Barrett (who was Rector of Booterstown and Carysfort with Mount Merrion from 2000 to 2004) was instituted as the Incumbent of Arklow, Inch and Kilbride on Friday 15th January 2021. Again, the parishioners, apart from the churchwardens who were allowed in the church, had to watch the Institution online. Arthur was Rector of Riverstick and Boyle (County Sligo and County Roscommon) 2004-2008, and Rector of Rossorry (Enniskillen) 2008-2014, before moving to Donegal where he was the Dean of Raphoe as well as being the Rector of Raphoe, Raymochy and Clonleigh.



Many parishioners will remember Arthur and

Brigid and their twin sons Charlie and Nathan (who are now in their twenties!) and Lucy who was born shortly after they arrived here in 2000. We welcome Arthur back to the Dioceses of Dublin and Glendalough and wish him, Brigid and Lucy every happiness and blessing in Arklow.

BISHOP-ELECT OF CLOGHER



When the Rev. Arthur Barret moved from Rossorry in Enniskillen to Raphoe in County Donegal in 2014, he was succeeded by the Rev. Canon Dr Ian Ellis. Ian was elected Bishop of Clogher by the Episcopal Electoral College for the Diocese of Clogher, which met online, on 9th November 2020. He succeeds the Most Revd John McDowell who took office as Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland at his translation on Tuesday, 28th April 2020.

Canon Ellis is married to Heather and they have three grown—up children.

Canon Ellis is well–known for his subsequent role as Secretary to the Church's Board of Education (Northern Ireland) where he served for 13 years, bringing together his experience as a school-

teacher and his time in parochial ministry. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, Ian's consecration/ordination as a bishop has been deferred a number of times. It is now hoped that he will be consecrated in May 2021.



GENERAL SYNOD

This year, the General Synod was due to meet in Armagh City Hotel on Thursday 13th May, Friday 14th May and Saturday 15th May 2021. Booking a venue for General Synod normally takes place three years in advance, and therefore, changing plans also requires advance notice. Hence, in November 2020, the Standing Committee of the Church of Ireland decided to postpone the 2021 General Synod in the hope of having a face-to-face General Synod and postponed the General Synod to Thursday 30th September, Friday 1st October and Saturday 2nd October 2021. However, it is now apparent that the General Synod will not take place physically, but6 will take place virtually, via Zoom, on those dates.

The Rector has been a member of General Synod for a number of years and Stephanie Morris who is a member of Booterstown and Carysfort Select Vestry, was elected to General Synod in 2017 and re-elected in 2020, and Quentin Teggin and Gordon Richards are now also on General Synod, having been elected at the triennial elections in 2020.




Our Daffodil Service was on

THE ALICE LEAHY TRUST

THE ALICE LEAHY TRUST continues to do extraordinary work in difficult circumstances.

In our two parishes, we have an ongoing working relationship with **THE ALICE LEAHY TRUST.** It is a non-political, non-denominational voluntary body which provides medical and related services for people who are homeless, operating out of a premises provided at a nominal rent by the Iveagh Trust. Up to 50 people (mostly men) call each morning, the majority of whom are sleeping out (aged 18-85 years).

TRUST is urgently in need the following items:

MEN'S CLOTHING.

Jeans, Track-suit bottoms, Jumpers, Water-Proof Jackets, Strong, Sturdy Shoes

THEY ALSO NEED ...

Cup-a-soups, Mini-bars (chocolate, etc.), toiletries

Whilst our churches are closed please leave any items at the back of St Philip and St James' Church on the <u>second Sunday</u> of the month at 11.30-12.00 (after the live-streamed service) —these will then be taken into the **Alice Leahy Trust.**

Parishioners have been very generous over the years and it is very much appreciated. But we would ask you to think carefully about the items that you donate; these items must be appropriate and suitable for people who are living on the streets. High-heel shoes, cocktail dresses, bikinis, etc. are all items that have been left at the back of our churches and these are **NOT** suitable.

Thank you to Sheila Chamberlain from St Thomas' and Viola Brady and Denise Richards from St Philip and St James' who sort the items and to Viola Brady who liaises with the **Alice Leahy Trust** and takes the items into them.




EMAIL! ... EMAIL! ... EMAIL!


community. Gathering for worship together is one aspect and a very important aspect of community, but being church, being a community, is more than that; it is about connection, compassion and care.




The Lenten displays on the Prayer Desk and on the Pulpit, and on the Altar/Communion Table


