Together Again

For the first time since 2019, we are able to have people in church to celebrate Easter, which is wonderful and we look forward in anticipation to Easter Day. Already, to have people attend services in Holy Week has been a reminder that worship is not so much about the content but about gathering together. I recognise that some people are anxious about being together in indoor spaces and to help to make people comfortable, we have retained a 2-metre socially-distanced seating area in the North Transept of St Philip and St James' Church. Some families are anxious about their children, due to their mixing in schools, possibly bringing COVID to other, more vulnerable members of the congregation. All of this is understandable, as we try to find ways to connect with people and for people to feel that they can come to worship—details of how and when services are on, can be found on page 2.

Sunday Club

We are really keen to get our Sunday Clubs back in action in September, and we need people to help lead them. Training for Sunday Club leaders, as well as Safeguarding Trust (child protection) training will be Provided and all leaders are required to be Garda vetted. So that training and all other requirements put in place, we need people to volunteer now. The more volunteers the better as it means that there can be a rota in place and the responsibilities are shared. The plan is to walk before we return to running(!) and to have Sunday Club once a month initially in both churches and to build from there. We would like to hear from you if you would be willing to help with either Sunday Club and we also want to hear from you if you would like your child(ren) to be a part of Sunday Club—please contact me.

Easter

That first Easter was a dark time; a time of corruption, oppression, evil, violence. We now look at Good Friday with the lens of Easter Day but for those who were there, they didn't have that; all they could see, hear and understand was how terrible it was, because it was truly awful. The corruption, violence, evil, oppression, greed is echoed in our current time as we look in horror at our screens and see what is happening in Ukraine and in other parts of the world where people are oppressed, and in this State, with gangland crime, and with homophobic murders and attacks. We desperately want it to change, to be better. What happened that first Easter was beyond human capacity. It was God's love that transformed that first Easter and it is God's love and God's peace that will transform our world in our time. We too need something bigger than our mere humanity which at the same time works through human beings to change the darkness of our time. Easter is about the transformation of the worst and darkest of times to times of hope, possibility and light. Our prayer and hope is for transformation so that all may live in safety and security, and that all will be free to be who they truly are.

SERVICES for APRIL – JUNE 2022

The two select vestries met jointly and gave careful consideration to all the points made by parishioners, and to various concerns such as those who are no longer able to go to church and who worship via the live -stream at the time that the service is on. It was felt that we should try to have it at time that would work for parishioners of both parishes, and for those who join us via the live-stream from nursing homes and other places of residential care, so we agreed to try having the service in St Philip and St James' Church at 11.00 - please note the time. However, please note that we will have a united service for the Blessing of the Animals at 10.30 in St Philip and St James' Church on the 4th Sunday of May (22nd May 2022). The services times, etc. will be reviewed by both select vestries to see if it is working.

The organist, Charles Pearson, and I will be doing a speedy hop across the Stillorgan Road!!!

- We will continue to administer Holy Communion using the individual cups and little wooden blocks.
- We ask that people would sanitise their hands on entering the churches.
- The seating plans will no longer be in place but we ask that people would use all the space in both churches and respect that some people may need more space than others in order to feel comfortable. The North Transept in St Philip and St James' Church will be an area where people who wish to socially distance, may sit and be socially distanced from others.
- Whilst mask wearing is no longer mandated, people may feel more comfortable wearing a mask and
 especially for singing, which we really appreciate being able to do again. We do understand that
 mask-wearing for children can be particularly stressful and that they may not wear them.

THANK YOU FROM THE ALICE LEAHY TRUST and THE CAPUCHIN DAY CENTRE

In our two parishes, we have an ongoing working relationship over many years with **The Alice Leahy Trust,** and over the past five years with the **Capuchin Day Centre**. Both organisations do extraordinary work with the homeless individuals and families.

The Alice Leahy Trust provides medical and related services for people who are homeless. Up to 50 people (mostly men) call each morning, the majority of whom are sleeping out (aged 18-85 years). The Capuchin Day Centre provides breakfast and lunches each day in addition to food parcels, clothing, showers, supplies of baby items, etc.

In 2021, the school and the parishes gave an enormous amount of pot meals, etc. and new underwear, socks, scarves, hats and gloves to The Alice Leahy Trust, and they gave lots of non-perishable food items to the Capuchin Day Centre and car loads of new toys so that children who are homeless would receive a gift from Santa Claus. Both organisations were so appreciative of that support.

The work is ongoing and both organisations are always in need of:

Jeans; track-suit bottoms; jumpers; water-proof jackets; strong, sturdy shoes; cup-a-soups, pot meals, mini-bars (chocolate, etc.), toiletries and NEW underwear and socks for men.

In addition, The Capuchin Day Centre is always in need the following items:

NEW underwear and socks for men, women and children, non-perishable food items; nappies and other baby items; female hygiene products.

There are areas at the back of both churches where items can be left—these will then be taken into the **Alice Leahy Trust** and the **Capuchin Day Centre.**

Parishioners have been very generous over the years and it is very much appreciated. But please think carefully about the items that you donate; these items must be appropriate and suitable for people who are living on the streets. High-heel shoes, cocktail dresses, bikinis, etc. are all items that have been left at the back of our churches and these are **NOT** suitable.

GENERAL SYNOD

This year, for the first time since 2019, the General Synod will meet in-person. The Assembly Buildings of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland is the only venue that could accommodate the General Synod with 1-metre social distancing as the Church endeavours to make people attending General Synod feel comfortable and confident in doing so. The General Synod will take place on Wednesday 4th May, Thursday 5th May and Friday 6th May 2022 in the Assembly Buildings in Belfast.

The Rector has been a member of General Synod for a number of years (elected by the clergy of Dublin Diocese) and the Lay Diocesan Synod Members of Dublin have elected Stephanie Morris, Quentin Teggin, Gordon Richards and Marcus Daly to represent the Diocese on General Synod. The last elections for General Synod were held in 2020, and the five people from our parishes will serve on General Synod up to and including General Synod 2023. The next set of triennial elections will take place at the time of the Diocesan Synod in 2023, which is usually held in early October.

Building on last year's Lenten Challenge, where I suggested that rather than giving things up, that we could pull together as a parochial group for our mental, spiritual, emotional and physical wellbeing and health, I am suggesting the same thing for this year. Two years of the pandemic have taken their toll. The idea is to take up something that gives you a focus each day. Last year, people walked, cycled, scooted or ran. Some learnt the 'Jerusalema' and danced it every day in Lent; others meditated or prayed for 15 minutes a day... it's up to you, but do something that benefits you physically, mentally, emotionally and spiritually, this Lent.

In addition, if people wish to make a donation, the money raised will be divided equally between the Irish Motor Neurone Disease Association, Blackrock Hospice and Ukrainian Relief (via the Bishops' Appeal). Originally, the money raised was to be divided between the Irish Motor Disease Association, Blackrock Hospice and the Parishes, but with the invasion of Ukraine and the overwhelming needs of the Ukrainian people, the two select vestries at their respective meetings voted unanimously that the portion for the parishes should be given to Ukrainian relief via the Bishops' Appeal.

The Irish Motor Neurone Disease Association and the Blackrock Hospice are two charities that are close to our hearts in our parishes and both charities have supported, and continue to support, families in our parishes. Bishops' Appeal is a relief and development fund that is administered by the bishops of the Church of Ireland. The Bishops' Appeal works with local agencies that it is confident manage their resources with honesty and integrity and that the funds are channelled appropriately and to serve the need for which the money is donated.

So far, just over €5,000 has been donated which is fantastic! Thank you to all who have donated. Your generosity will make a difference.

The Irish Motor Neurone Disease Association is the only organisation of its kind in the country. It is dedicated to working on behalf of people living with MND and their families and carers. Our key services include home visits by our 4 MND nurses, financial assistance towards home help and the supply of specialised equipment on loan. We also fund and promote research into the causes and treatments of MND.



THEIR AIM IS:

To encourage and promote the best methods of care, education, research and treatment for people with Motor Neurone Disease throughout Ireland, contributing to worldwide efforts in research and development of treatment. To establish and promote models of good practice in the delivery of specialised services to their patients, their families and carers, setting standards of excellence. To communicate widely, knowledge of Motor Neurone Disease and related disorders in order to raise awareness in the wider community.



Blackrock Hospice

For almost 20 years, Blackrock Hospice has been operating from its base in Sweetman's Avenue. During 2022, Our Lady's Hospice & Care Services is investing in significant renovations.

This work will ensure that Blackrock Hospice meets the needs of the community now and for the future. These changes will make real improvements to the care provided by Blackrock Hospice. However, the Hospice is closed during the renovation period which will have no impact on those being looked after in their own homes by the Home Care Team;

Out-patient appointments will be provided in 203 Merrion Road; In-patients will be accommodated in either Harold's Cross or Wicklow Hospice according to their preference and availability.

The project will cost in the region of €6.5 million in fundraised income for which there is a current shortfall of €2 million.
