Challenges after COVID

COVID was a watershed event in our lives. Whilst, thanks to vaccines, etc., we are now living with COVID, things in our lives have changed and there is a new normal. Some things have been able to go back to the way they were pre-COVID, others will not. One of the things that has changed is attendance at worship. A recent survey, conducted by Amárach Research of 1,500 adults throughout Ireland, found that 41% of Roman Catholics who went to mass regularly before COVID, no longer do so. The reason for approximately 25% of those who no longer attend mass is because they "still have concerns about COVID-19" and that they prefer to watch it online or on TV to keep safe, which means that 75% of those who no longer go to mass do so for other reasons, such as having fallen out of the habit, or they started to do other things during COVID when churches were shut, etc. The figures are comparable to the experience across the Church of Ireland and in our parishes.

During the pandemic, a number of parishioners, who were regular attendees, have moved into residential care or have became no longer able to get out and about, and for them, the live-streaming is their way of attending worship, often with family members joining them on a Sunday morning so that they can 'go to church together'. Since March 2020, we have been trying to meet the particular challenges brought to worship and church services by COVID; in the early part of COVID, we had worship via Facebook lasting about 15 minutes, we then moved on to having the webcam allowing us to live-stream services with no congregation in church. We provided almost 100 Midweek Musical Treats to lift people's spirits. Intermittently for over a year, we were able to have limited services with restricted numbers and social-distancing; we had to have 'booking-in' for Christmas services. Now, we are back in church without social distancing or limitations but there are still challenges... as mentioned above... and we are trying to find ways to facilitate and encourage people to worship. You will see on page 6, the House of Bishops has issued a letter about returning to using the common chalice only. That too presents a challenge as people continue to have concerns about receiving from the common chalice. With the optimum time for a live-streaming start-time of between 10.30 and 11.00 to facilitate those in nursing homes and the return of Sunday Club, and trying to give families an option of an early and a later time for Sunday Club, I have consulted with both select vestries about worship for over a year. Whilst it is not the remit of select vestries to decide on service times—that responsibility falls to the Rector—I felt that it was better to consult. There are no easy answers: we are going to try the following service times on a Sunday to see how they work: 8.30 Holy Communion (alternating month-about), 9.30 service in St Thomas' Church and 11.00 service in St Philip and St James' Church. We will have the Sausage Service at 18.30 once a month in St Philip and St James' Church and the Midweek Holy Communion Service on a Wednesday at 10.30 in St Thomas' Church. United Services will be as announced.

Easter

The pandemic was like a desert experience... lonely, anxious, isolating. For many people, there were Good Friday experiences in the pandemic as loved ones died from COVID and other illnesses. There were times too of an Easter Day experience, of hope and new life. With the ebb and flow of life, sometimes if feels like we are in Holy Saturday... somewhere between the darkness of Good Friday and the hope and possibility of Easter Day But even if we are 'stuck' in Holy Saturday, we do so with the knowledge and hope of the resurrection, and that makes our experience of Holy Saturday, completely different to what it would have been for Jesus' disciples. Good Friday and Easter Day changed lives and our understanding of the world forever. COVID-19 changed our lives and our understanding of the world forever. We cannot go back, we can only go forward, embracing the future and the hope and promise of the resurrection.


Holy Baptism

THANK YOU FROM THE ALICE LEAHY TRUST and THE CAPUCHIN DAY CENTRE

Our two parishes have an ongoing working relationship with The Alice Leahy Trust the Capuchin Day Centre. The Alice Leahy Trust provides medical and related services for people who are homeless. Up to 50 people (mostly men) call each morning, the majority of whom are sleeping out (aged 18-85 years). The Capuchin Day Centre provides breakfast and lunches each day in addition to food parcels, clothing, showers, supplies of baby items, etc.

In 2021 and 2022, the school and the parishes have given pot meals, etc. and new underwear, socks, scarves, hats and gloves to The Alice Leahy Trust, and lots of non-perishable food items to the Capuchin Day Centre and and new toys so that children who are homeless would receive a gift from Santa Claus. Both organisations were so appreciative of that support.

The work is year-round and both organisations are always in need of:

Jeans; track-suit bottoms; jumpers; water-proof jackets; strong, sturdy shoes; cup-a-soups, pot meals, mini-bars (chocolate, etc.), toiletries and NEW underwear and socks for men.

In addition, The Capuchin Day Centre is always in need the following items:

NEW underwear and socks for men, women and children, non-perishable food items; nappies and other baby items; female hygiene products.

There are areas at the back of both churches where items can be left, and will be passed on.

Parishioners have been very generous over the years and it is very much appreciated. But please think carefully about the items that you donate; these items must be appropriate and suitable for people who are living on the streets. High-heel shoes, cocktail dresses, bikinis, etc. are all items that have been left at the back of our churches and these are NOT suitable.

GENERAL SYNOD

This year, the General Synod will take place in a different format. It will be in-person for two days and what would have been the third day, will be via Zoom on two evenings the following week. There are a number of reasons for this:

- 1. For attendees at General Synod who are working, they needed to take two days off work when it was a 3-day in-person synod. This is not feasible for many, such as teachers, and even if it is, they are giving up two days' holidays to attend General Synod. For those who are farmers attending General Synod, it can be difficult, if not impossible to leave a farm for three consecutive days.
- 2. The cost of attending General Synod is borne by the attendees. Accommodation is expensive and by reducing the number of overnights required, it reduces the cost.

Tso, this year, the General Synod will meet on Friday 12th and Saturday 13th May 2023, in-person, in the Clayton White's Hotel in Wexford town, and will meet via Zoom on the evening of Tuesday 16th May 2023, and if necessary, also on the evening of Thursday 18th May 2023 via Zoom.

The opening service for the General Synod will be held in St Iberius' Church, Wexford, at 9.30 on Friday 12th May 2023 and the 'business' of General Synod will begin at 11.00 in the Clayton White's Hotel.

The Rector has been a member of General Synod for a number of years (elected by the clergy of Dublin Diocese) and the Lay Diocesan Synod Members of Dublin have elected Stephanie Morris, Quentin Teggin, Gordon Richards and Marcus Daly to represent the Diocese on General Synod 2020-2023. Elections for the next triennium (General Synod 2024-2026 inclusive) will take place at the time of the Diocesan Synod in 2023, which this year, will be Tuesday 3rd October 2023.

House of Bishops

The Administration of the Holy Communion

From time to time, during and since the Covid 19 pandemic, the bishops have sought to offer counsel to the wider church particularly concerning the manner of the administration of the Holy Communion. In all our statements, we have sought to combine seemliness and safety and to take the best professional advice available to us.

It is approximately a year now since we encouraged the restored use of the common cup at Holy Communion. This is the traditional Anglican practice in relation to the administration of the sacrament, and is enshrined in the formularies of the Book of Common Prayer. The sharing of the Cup of the Lord is rich in meaning and value for the communicant, and only in the most extraordinary medical emergency could we take it upon ourselves to advise that the cup should be withdrawn, or that the consecrated wine of the Eucharist should be administered by other temporary means such as individual vessels.

We recognised a year ago that it would take some time for the cup to be restored across the whole church, that there would for a while need to be a degree of variety of practice, and that the position of those who remained nervous about receiving from it should be respected. Nevertheless, cognisant of the present situation in terms of public health, and mindful of professional wisdom which indicates the extremely low risk associated with the transmission of infection via a shared silver vessel containing the fermented fruit of the vine and used in an ordered liturgical context, we have all agreed to provide the following directions to the church. We believe we are doing this in a situation where in fact the common cup has already been largely restored around the parishes of the Church of Ireland.

- specific permissions given by individual bishops for the use of individual vessels at Holy Communion will lapse after Pentecost Sunday 2023
- Thereafter the administration of the consecrated wine at Holy Communion in our churches should involve the common cup only
- Those who remain for their own reasons nervous about receiving from the common cup should be respected, and they should receive in one kind only, with an assurance that the Church teaches that the sacrament can be fully received in one kind
- People who are obviously the victims of infections that involve coughing and sneezing should
 probably think twice before coming to church, and certainly out of courtesy to others should show
 temporary gracious restraint in not seeking to receive from the common cup
- We ask that communicants do not themselves intinct (dip) the consecrated bread they have received in the wine. This is based on clear medical advice intinction can spread infection from fingers to the wine, and crumbs of bread left in the wine can be problematical for other people who wish to receive it, eg coeliacs
- Chalices should be kept scrupulously clean, and washed with very hot soapy water after services before being put away. Defects on chalices eg torn lips should be professionally repaired
- It is generally held that noble metal rather than pottery vessels can be used more hygienically
- It is really important that chalices be wiped fully using clean cloth (preferably linen) purificators. The use of tissues can spread infection; the use of proper cloth purificators significantly diminishes it.

In issuing this guidance we are concerned that communicants feel safe, that they conduct themselves with mutual courtesy, and that above all the supper of the Lord is administered with reverence and with joy. The long period during which the common cup had to be withdrawn only served to remind us of how precious a thing it is, how full of Scriptural resonances, how it speaks to us of our utter equality before God as we gather in sacramental unity, how the beauty of its meaning must never be taken for granted. In that spirit we pray that the full restoration of the common cup, surrounded of course by care and courtesy, can be for the whole Church of Ireland a matter of the greatest joy.

Summer Fête

Mount Merrion Select Vestry has decided not to hold a Summer Fête at St Thomas' Church in May 2023, due to a lack of people available to run the fête. A generous bequest from the late Venerable Bill Heney has taken some of the financial pressure off to have a fête this year. However, the fête is about more than just money, it is also a community event for the parish and for the wider neighbourhood and community. It is very much hoped that we will have a fête in May 2024, but we will need people to put their hands up and volunteer to run stalls, erect tents and help to make the fête in our sesquicentennial (150th) year.




St Philip and St James' Sunday Club

25th DUBLIN (MOUNT MERRION) SCOUT GROUP



This year promises to be an exciting one for the Scouts and newly formed Rover unit as they prepare to spend the first week of July camping in Iceland. This trip was originally due to take place three years ago, but COVID restrictions intervened. Those

who were in Scouts then have since turned 18 years of age, and must therefore be Garda vetted and undergo safeguarding training. Leaders have had to gain new qualifications to lead a camp abroad and great credit is due to Cedric Heather and his team who have put a huge amount of time into organising the trip and seeing that all is in order. The Scouts are plan-

They have also been out in the community, completing a very productive clean-up of the nature reserve in Sandymount, and walking with the Rector on one of her daily 6 kms in aid of the Turkey and Syria earthquake victims. We are now planning our summer camp-not quite as exotic as Iceland but just as challenging and exciting. In preparation for camp, the Cubs have learnt how to prepare food for cooking safely and hygienically.

The Beaver Colony has grown in numbers recently with a few new girls coming on board. They have been

Sponsor a Chair

St Philip and St James' Church

In removing the pews from the east end of the nave and from some of both transepts, our desire was not to remove seating but to have seating that was more flexible, which could be arranged in a variety of ways and which would also facilitate those who are wheelchair users to be able to sit with the family and friends in the midst of the congregation rather than sitting in the aisle. The Select Vestry has been in discussions with Irish Contract Seating who are based in Dromod in County Leitrim—they are the same company that made the new Communion Table or Altar and the 'wedding chairs' in St Thomas' Church. Out of three samples, the Select Vestry has chosen the one called the Christ Church Chair and it is photographed here. The plan (and indeed, the advice from Irish Contract Seating) is to have the wood of the chair the same colour as the pews and the upholstery the same colour as the pew runners. The logo that will be carved on the back-rest is our parish logo without the lettering. There will be a provision for a small brass plaque on the top of the back-rest, to facilitate an engraving if someone would like to donate a chair in memory of someone or as a gift to the church. The cost of a chair is €275 (including the brass plaque and engraving).
