

through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.



<u>The Old Testament Reading – Isaiah</u> 2: 1–5

The Old Testament Reading is from the book of the prophet Isaiah, chapter 2, beginning at verse 1.

The word that Isaiah son of Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem.

² In days to come

the mountain of the LORD's house shall be established as the highest of the mountains,

and shall be raised above the hills; all the nations shall stream to it.

³ Many peoples shall come and say,
'Come, let us go up to the mountain of the LORD,

to the house of the God of Jacob; that he may teach us his ways

and that we may walk in his paths.' For out of Zion shall go forth instruction,

and the word of the LORD from Jerusalem.

⁴ He shall judge between the nations, and shall arbitrate for many peoples; they shall beat their swords into ploughshares,

and their spears into pruning-hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation.

neither shall they learn war any more.

⁵ O house of Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of the LORD!

The New Testament Reading -Matthew 5: 1-12

The New Testament Reading is from the Gospel according to St Matthew, chapter 5, beginning at verse 1.

When Jesus saw the crowds, he went up the mountain; and after he sat down, his disciples came to him. ²Then he began to speak, and taught them, saying:

3 'Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

4 'Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.

5 'Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.

6 'Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.

7 'Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy.

8 'Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.

9 'Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God. 10 'Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. 11 'Blessed are you when people revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. ¹²Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you.


Make me a channel of your peace: it is in pardoning that we are pardoned,

Act of Remembrance

Let us remember before God, and commend to his sure keeping those who have died in the cause of peace, those whom we knew, and whose memory we treasure; all who have lived and died in the service of others: in the past and in recent years, in far away places and on this island.

Silence

Over one hundred years on from the first day of remembrance, we remember all who died in World War One and in World War Two... no one side had a monopoly on grief... the loss of life was unimaginable... loss of life in the armed forces... loss of life of civilians...

Those whose family members are here...

Those whose families came here to pray for their husbands, fathers, brothers, sons, uncles, nephews... and daughters, sisters, aunts and nieces, who served in the nursing corps... On the Sunday nearest the 100th anniversary of their deaths, we have remembered forty-two young people from our three parishes of Booterstown, Carysfort and Mount Merrion, who died in World War One... This year, for the first time, we remember four parishioners who died in World War Two..


