Introduction

Mothering Sunday, which occurs on the Fourth Sunday of Lent, is a day honouring mother churches, the church where one is baptised and becomes "a child of the church", celebrated since the Middle Ages in this part of the world. On Mothering Sunday, Christians have historically visited their mother church—the church in which they received the sacrament of baptism.

Constance Adelaide Smith revived its modern observance beginning in 1913 to honour Mother Church, 'mothers of earthly homes', the Virgin Mary (mother of Jesus), and Mother Nature. It gained popularity in response to the originally American Mother's Day. Mothering Sunday is now often known as "Mother's Day" and has become a secular celebration of mothers and motherhood.

So, on this day we give thanks to God who gives us New Birth, and for the Church which, like a mother, nurtures us in the life of the Spirit. We also give thanks for our own human mothers, for those who give us an experience of a mothering, nurturing kind of love, be the mothers or others in our lives, and we give thanks for all the qualities of mothering, given and received in our homes and in this community.
